- please send an old towel for the children to either wipe themselves or sit on in the car/bus on the way home
- the Holi powder is sold as EU-71 certified and perfectly safe. The colour is non toxic and harmless, made from cornflour and is washable
- Pupils with allergies and intolerances will not be made/able to join in. They will be included as photographers.
